Ukraine's Libraries in Wartime Ulia Gosart & Rhonda Clark

Background

Russian full-scale invasion: 2022-today

June 16-17 attack, third largest, Kyiv City and Chernihiv, Cherkasy, Odesa, Sumy, and Zaporizhia oblasts;* killed over 20 people**

Casualties (military):


Russia: over 1 million (June 12, 2025)***

Ukraine: over 43.000 (March 2025)****

Casualties (civilians, June 2025):

Russia: 652 killed (Russian source)*****

Ukraine: 46.085, including 13.341 killed (OHCHR)*****





State of public libraries

- State of libraries, as of 2025 (May 2025):
- Number of functioning libraries went down 17% since 2022, with total 11.933 entities out of 14.351 (2022)
- 214 libraries lost their buildings, or space where they were housed, esp. in Donetsk (75), Kherson (25), Kharkiv (53) regions; 904 partly destroyed
- **492 libraries completely lost collections** and records, esp. in Luhansk (290), Donetsk (75), Kharkiv (53) Kherson (25) regions; **561** lost their technical equipment
- Damage estimated \$ 1.819.199*

Overview

- Partnership with National Library of Ukraine named after Y. Mydryi since 2022 (symposia)
- 2024-2025 Phase 1
 - Collection of sample of photos (ULA, Ukraine): 14 images
 - Construction of main framework (US, volunteer)
- 2025 Phase 2
 - Collection of photos from the regions (ULA, Ukraine): over 500 images
 - Construction of archive by regions (US, volunteer)


