

#### BACKGROUND: Teaching with Primary Sources

- Mass digitization has increased access to unique forms of digital heritage (yearbooks, city directories, oral histories, photographs) in regional archives.

#### RESEARCH QUESTIONS

- How can we build partnerships between K-12 classrooms and regional archival collections to empower the use of digital heritage?
- What impact might place-based learning have on student engagement with digital heritage?

## PROJECT OVERVIEW

- Launched online survey for K-12 educators (ongoing)
- Organized pilot workshop for K-12 educators in partnership with the North Carolina Collection at the Durham Public Library (Fall 2024-April 2025)
- Conduct focus groups with K-12 educators (Fall 2025)


## Considerations and Guiding Questions:

- Who?
  - Students and K-12 Educators
- What?
  - Wants and needs
  - Connection to NC Carolina Social Studies Standards
  - Engaging, thought-provoking, combinable, counternarratives
- When and Where?
  - Online/Digital; Digital Archives
- How?
  - o In collection selection, consider...
    - Themes
    - Collection features
    - NC Standards
    - CUREs and Backwards Design



## John Schelp Postcard Collection<sup>1</sup>

- Themes: Social life, NC Life
- Features: Postcards; Digital; Notes
- **AH.B.1.2** Critique multiple perspectives of American identity in terms of opportunity, prosperity, and crisis.



# Early Project "Findings"

- Community partnerships provided a welcoming space for workshop
  - Making contact with teachers is difficult without a K-12 teacher on the team
- Archival intelligence (Yakel & Torres, 2003) remains a hurdle for effectively engaging with non-academic audiences
  - Educators do not know much about archives or digital collections
  - We overestimated how much the teachers might already know about archives they did not know that digital collections do not require password access, for example
- Educators want Plug and Play Lesson Plans > Training in primary source archival literacy

- Develop plug-n-play instructional exercises that help educators teach regional histories with digital primary sources
- Testing and evaluation of frameworks and models for inclusive teaching and how they might be transferable for instruction with archival materials
  - o E.g., CURES
- Adopt community-based participatory research methods through partnerships with UNC School of Education and the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction
