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Impetus for developing digital preservation webinar series

- Call for facilitators by Andrew Leith, Conservation and Collections Program Manager for the Chicago Cultural Alliance - late April 2020
 - COVID-19 pandemic - remote work / professional development

Methods

Rapid lit review/environmental scan... of adult learning styles

Characteristics of Adult Learners

- Need to know why they are learning something
- Learn through doing
- Are problem solvers
- Learn best when the subject is of immediate use
- Prefer social interaction
- Want to use their life experiences in the classroom
- Want to integrate new ideas with existing knowledge

- Digital preservation is not access

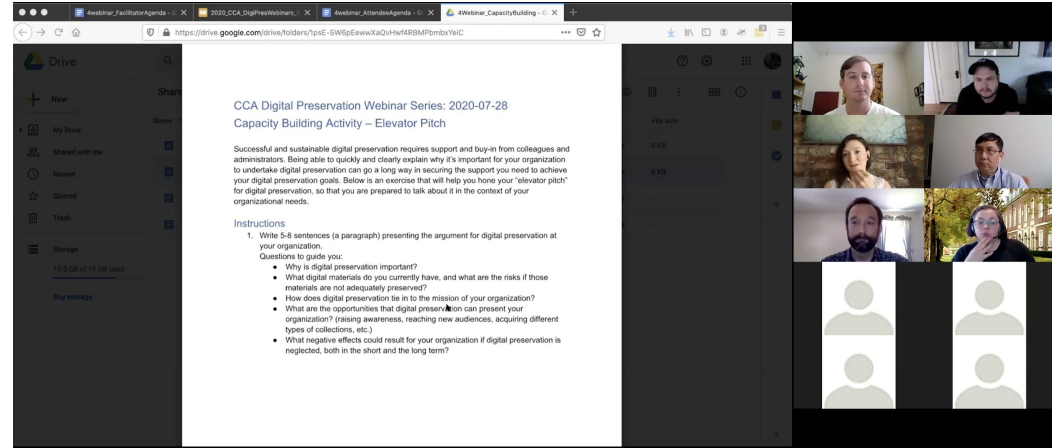

Length and Delivery

- Four, one-hour webinars delivered via Zoom every other week
 - Avoids content overload
 - Allows for contemplation
- Zoom Etiquette
 - Muting
 - Video off
- Audience Participation
 - Breakout rooms
 - Text chat in Zoom - synchronous
 - Audio questions in Zoom - synchronous
 - Document questions in session Google Doc - asynchronous
 - Contact Andrew and/or facilitators between sessions - asynchronous



Assessment - Workshop Effectiveness

- Surveys
 - Pre-workshop
 - Post-workshop
- Virtual Environments
 - Pros:
 - Allowed facilitators from several regional academic institutions to work together and present
 - In person may have been cost prohibitive without grant funds
 - Same for attendees: less travel and time away from work
 - Gave the presenters time to develop the presentations
 - Gave attendees time to digest the information
 - Cons
 - In-person allows for facilitators to gauge engagement more clearly
 - More difficult to get people to collaborate and speak up
 - Technology challenges
