## American Archivist Reviews Section Report to the Editorial Board

#### **Summary**

Over the past year, I have maintained the number of reviews in the Reviews Section, and have encouraged more reviews of open access publications/scholarship and reports. Eleven reviews were published in 81:1, the Spring/Summer 2018 issue, and eleven reviews and one review essay are slated to be published in 81:2, the Fall/Winter 2018 issue.

Work on the joint *American Archivist* and Publications Board podcast has progressed since the last report to the board in February 2018. We have recorded two interviews thus far, and have two more interviews scheduled. SAA will be publicizing the podcast at the 2018 annual meeting and the podcast team looks forward to officially launching the podcast later this fall.

## **Highlights**

#### **Podcast**

Since the February 2018 Editorial Board meeting in Chicago, Gloria Gonzalez and I have begun working with Publications Board members Nicole Milano and Colleen McFarland Rademaker, Ashley Levine from Artifex Press, and Teresa Brinati and Matt Black from SAA to launch the "Archives in Context" podcast. We revised the title of the podcast slightly so that it would be clear to a non-archival audience that this is a podcast about archives (revised from "<incontext>" to "Archives in Context"). We are grateful to Teresa for working with us and a designer to create a logo for the podcast, which will be used for iTunes and the podcast website (below):



We have recorded two interviews so far: Nicole Milano and Ashley Levine interviewed Kären Mason for *Perspectives on Women's Archives* (SAA, 2013), and I interviewed Michelle Caswell for *Archiving the Unspeakable: Silence, Memory, and Photographic Record in Cambodia* (University of Wisconsin, 2014). An interview with Cal Lee is scheduled for September and another interview with Courtney Dean on *Acid Free* later this fall. Once we have at least three interviews recorded, we plan to officially launch the podcast this fall.

#### **Expansion of Reviews**

The Reviews Section has been expanded in several ways, including by number, types of publications reviewed, and by including more international reviewers. At the last editorial board meeting, we discussed whether to review exhibitions; but, given some of the logistical

issues of reviewing physical exhibits in the journal which board members raised, it was decided to explore reviewing exhibits on the Reviews Portal (and we currently have one review of an exhibit tentatively scheduled). However, digital publications/exhibits will be reviewed both in the journal and on the Reviews Portal (e.g., a review of a Scalar publication is in process for the Reviews Section). I have also started to include an introduction to the Reviews Section; the first one was published in issue 81:1.

I am still hoping to include reviews of publications in languages other than English. My main goal is to continue making the Reviews Section an inclusive space that highlights and evaluates the breadth of the archival literature.

#### **Reviews Portal**

See Gloria Gonzalez's report (pages 5-10). Gloria has launched a new series focused on archives and pop culture on the Reviews Portal. She has also continued efforts to recruit more students and new professionals as reviewers.

#### **Goals and Discussion for Board**

- Continue to occasionally include more review essays
- Explore including reviews of older, classic publications in the archival literature that bring forward new perspectives (e.g., re-reviewing *Archives Power* during its 10-year anniversary in 2019, perhaps in coordination with interviewing him on the book for the podcast)
- Continue to include more reviews of publications published through various digital open-access platforms
- Include reviews of publications in other languages
- Consider recruiting a few more editors and/or recruit editors-at-large for the Reviews Portal

# **The American Archivist** Reviews Portal August 2018 Update

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## Goals for 2018

Our goals for 2018 are to **become a multimedia platform** by launching a new podcast, **increase outreach** by creating a repeatable reviewer recruitment campaign with documentation, and use the website stats from 2017 to **outline strategies for increasing new site visitors and visits**.

## **Podcast**

The SAA Publications and The American Archivist editorial boards are jointly launching a podcast that highlights the archival literature and technologies, and the authors and creators behind them. So far the team has recorded interviews with Kären Mason, Curator at the Iowa Women's Archives about "One Book, One Profession" publication, *Perspectives on Women's Archives* (SAA, 2013) as well as Michelle Caswell on *Archiving the Unspeakable: Silence, Memory, and the Photographic Record in Cambodia*. We're also working with composer Adam Fligsten on the theme music. The podcast is being promoted at SAA, and scheduled to launch in September 2018. The team is also scheduling the following interviews for the first season:

- Cal Lee, incoming editor of The American Archivist, on his future plans for the journal
- Courtney Dean, Acid Free, the Los Angeles Archives Collective's Magazine
- Rand Jimerson, Archives Power (SAA, 2009)
- Anthony Cocciolo, Moving Image and Sound Collections for Archivists (SAA, 2017)

## **Overview of Reviews Since February Update**

Since *The American Archivist* Editorial Board met in Chicago in February 2018, three reviews were posted to the portal. Two reviews are currently in process and we are also seeking reviewers for four specific resources, which described in the section on increasing outreach below. Typically, the reviews on the portal focus on technology in archives, digital projects, and tools that support archives access and description. To this end, Nora Dolliver, Archives Assistant at the Special Collections Research Center at the University of Michigan Library, published a review of <a href="The Prague Spring Archive">The Prague Spring Archive</a>, "a collaborative effort among librarian for European Studies Ian Goodale, the LBJ Presidential Library, and the Center for Russian, East European, and Eurasian Studies at UT-Austin" that launched in 2017. Additionally, the Jefferson Quotes and Family Letters Project at Monticello is being reviewed by Rivi Feinsilber, a graduate student at Simmons College. Rivi's review is scheduled to be published on Tuesday, August 22, 2018.

To supplement these reviews and increase readership, we added to this scope by partnering with Samantha Cross, the Assistant Archivist for CallisonRTKL in Seattle, to launch a new series to examine how archives and archivists are depicted in pop culture. So far in the *Pop Culture and Archives Series*, Samantha focuses on archives and Star Wars in *Page Turners, They Are Not:* the Last Jedi and the Archives and archives and RPGs in *Roll Initiative: RPGs and the Archives*. The series received positive feedback from readers and both posts hit a record number of views for the portal with 1,229 and 856 unique visits respectively.

## **Increasing Outreach**

We are currently seeking reviewers for the following resources:

- Civil Rights in Mississippi Digital Archive
- The Syrian Archive

Using feedback from the Editorial Board meeting in February 2018, we updated the call for reviewers (new version below). We sent the new call out to the Archival Educators List, UNC Lists, UT Austin Insider List, UT Austin SAA-UT List, the iSchool at Illinois, the UCLA Student Listserv, the Pitt Student Listservs, and the Michigan Student Listservs. Gloria also worked with Bethany and Abigail to publish a call for reviewers in <a href="the March / April 2018">the March / April 2018</a> issue of <a href="Archival Outlook">Archival Outlook</a> later this year and send the announcement to student liservs again as the fall quarter begins. Bethany and Gloria are looking into new outreach models to increase the number of submissions, and one consideration is adapting a multi-editor approach, inspired by the team that maintains ALA Association of College and Research Libraries' DH+Lib blog.

## **Statistics**

- So far in 2018, the number of unique visitors to the site increased 14.30% and number of visits increased 0.43% compared to 2017.
- So far in 2018, people visited the site from 80 countries and we've seen an increase in readership in the US, Canada, Brazil, Germany, Japan, Spain, France, South Korea, Poland, Italy, Egypt, New Zealand, and Costa Rica.
- So far in 2018, there has been a slight decline in readers located in the United Kingdom, Ireland, and Australia.
- In 2017, people visited the site from 79 countries.


- So far in 2018, the SAA Blogs resource was viewed 68 times compared to 363 times in 2017.
