Participatory Archival Research and Development in Action: Updates from DLF's BDAWG

Abstract: Since its formation in 2017, the Digital Library Federation's Born-Digital Access Working Group (BDAWG) has taken a research-in-practice approach to developing community resources that help guide practitioners in providing access to born-digital material, with a focus on archival collections. In April 2020, Appel, Clemens, Hagenmaier, and Meyerson published "Participatory Archival Research and Development: The Born-Digital Access Initiative," codifying a framework around some of the approaches our informal community had been practicing. In this platform presentation we will apply the Participatory Archival Research and Development (PAR&D) framework to DLF BDAWG's past and present projects, by mapping our activities to the framework and sharing specific examples of the framework in action on the ground.
