I. PERIODICALS

A. The American Archivist

- Much of the fall was spent wrapping up Greg Hunter's term and welcoming Cal Lee. Cal visited the SAA office on Oct. 10–11 to receive training on all aspects of production and administration of the journal.
- Outgoing Editor Greg Hunter's two terms at the helm of the journal were acknowledged by the SAA Council with a resolution in December.
- Greg submitted all of the content for the Spring/Summer 2018 issue in December. That issue is currently in production and is projected to be available in June.

B. Archival Outlook

- Cal Lee is the "Someone You Should Know" in the January/February 2018 issue of *Archival Outlook*! Click <u>here</u> to read the interview.
- Taking a page from *The American Archivist*'s playbook, the latest issue of the magazine features its first translation of an article. "Building a Community Archives: Archivo Cultural de Cañar, Ecuador" by Judy Blankenship and Natalie Baur was first published in the May/June 2017 *Archival Outlook*, then translated into Spanish—"El Archivo del Cañar"—by LACCHA for the January/February 2018 issue so that the Canari people could read about their archives.

- <u>Ad Exchanges:</u> Initiated advertising exchanges with three other journals—*Journal of Film Preservation, IASA Journal* (International Association of Sound and Audiovisual Archives), and *Journal of the American Institute for Conservation*. If there are other journals in which you recommend we engage in exchange ads, please let us know.
- <u>Regionals Meetings</u>: Promotional materials including complimentary copies of *The American Archivist* and *Archival Outlook* were sent to 11 organizations in the fall, including South Carolina Archival Association, Houston Archives Bazaar, Cleveland Archival Roundtable, Society of Ohio Archivists, Archivists of the Houston Area, Oklahoma Archivists Association, Clyfford Still Museum's workshop and outreach program in Denver, Kentucky Council on Archives, Association of Maine Archives and Museums, Midwest Archives Conference, and the Louisiana Archives and Manuscripts Association. We are now gearing up for spring meetings.
- <u>Students and New Archives Professionals</u>: To reduce overage, SAA offered complimentary copies of *The American Archivist* and *Archival Outlook* to SNAP members and Student Chapters—24 of which took us up on the offer, including student chapters at Wayne State University, University of Southern California-Pasadena, Western Washington University, University of California-Los Angeles, University of Washington, University of Maryland-College Park, University of Hawaii at Manoa, and a high school archiving class at Rockhurst High School in Kansas City, Missouri. We will do the same promotion this spring.

II. NEW OUTPUT (all open access)

A. Case Studies from Trends in Archives Practice

The 20 modules in the Trends in Archives Practice series address the practical management of archives and manuscript collections in the digital age. Almost every module includes case studies. Some 27 case studies tackle descriptive standards, appraisal and acquisition, digital preservation, primary sources, digital rights, and archival arrangement and description. All were made available for free online in December. The modules/books from which they are derived are for sale.

V. AWARDS PROGRAM

A. New Submission Software

SmarterSelect software to manage submissions to the awards competition was acquired in October and will make administration of the recognition program—both the application process and the selection process—more fluid and easier to track. The submission side was implemented and beta tested for 20 awards in November/December, then launched at the end of December. The evaluation side was implemented and beta tested for 20 awards in January/February and will be available for use by the selection committees just in time for the evaluation process, which begins March 1.

B. Journal-Related Awards

Just a reminder that two of the awards relate to *The American Archivist*. First, the Theodore Calvin Pease Award is for superior writing achievement by a student of archival studies as nominated by their instructor. The winning entry is published in the journal. Please encourage the archival educators you know to submit a student paper. The deadline is Feb. 28. Second, the Fellows' Ernst Posner Award is for an outstanding essay in most recent volume of journal. The selection committee will begin its deliberations shortly on the 2017 content.
